INFORMATION

Gothenburg is Sweden's second largest city after the capital Stockholm. The city is located on Sweden's west coast and has 1 070 000 inhabitants. The city Gothenburg was founded on the initiative of King Gustav II Adolf and received its city privileges in 1621.

Gothenburg is a very walkable city that has many attractions that are within walking distance of each other. You can do everything from riding carousels on Liseberg to going to Gothenburgs city museum or shopping on the avenue.

Since 1879 Gothenburg has also had tram traffic. Every summer you can see old trams going around the city. They are dusted off and polished every year, the oldest tram is from 1902.

Among the things Gothenburg is most famous for is the beautiful archipelago. It offers beautiful little wooden houses, cozy marinas and lots of fresh seafodd. It's something you don't want to miss.

GETTING TO GOTHENBURG

Gothenburg can easily be reached:

By plane:

Gothenburg-Landvetter Airport is located approximately 25 km from the center of Gothenburg. It takes about 35 minutes to travel with airport shuttle between the airport and Gothenburg city. At the airport, you will find the bus stop directly outside the terminal. In Gothenburg city there are several stops but the station at Gothenburg central station is called Nils Ericson-terminal. The bus goes two to three times an hour depending on the time of day. A one-way ticket costs about 10,73 euro for an adult if you buy the ticket online and 12,52 euros if you buy it on the airport. At the airport you can buy tickets through ticket machines located at the exit

to the bus and outside at the bus stop. You can also by tickets at 7-Eleven, at Swedavias information centers and directly at the bus. Be aware that not all places take cash.

If you prefer to travel by taxi, you can always travel with Taxi Göteborg to a fixed price to and from the airport. To take a taxi from the airport make sure to get a "Taxi Göteborg" taxi from the taxi stand since there are several lines of taxi companies with very different prices and not all of them have fixed price. To book a taxi with Taxi Göteborg when in town call +46 (0)31-650000.

By train:

Gothenburg can be reached by train from many countries and the main station is the Gothenburg Central Station. The best way to get there is through Germany via cities like Frankfurt and Hamburg and then through Denmark via Copenhagen.

By car:

There are several different options on how to get to Sweden by car. An option is to take the Öresund Bridge between Copenhagen and Malmö. Another option is to take a ferry to Sweden from e.g. the UK, Denmark, Finland, Germany, Norway, Poland, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania. From Germany you can take a ferry from Kiel to Gothenburg or from either Rostock or Travemünde to Trelleborg. From Denmark you can take a ferry from Frederikshavn to Gothenburg, from Grenaa to Varberg or from Helsingor to Helsingborg. The motorway E20 enters Sweden via the Öresunds Bridge and connects to E6 in Malmö, from where E6 and E20 have common motorway sections to Gothenburg.

Taxi:

Please have in mind that you only travel with **Taxi Gothenburg.** Other companies can charge you triple as much for the same distance.

The weather in Gothenburg varies from +18 at midday to down to approximately +10 at night. Sometimes the weather is cloudy and rainy in September.

EXCURSION ON SUNDAY 24 SEPTEMBER.

About 45 km north of Gothenburg is a small town called Marstrand. The sailing town and seaside resort is located at the far end of the archipelago and is very popular during the summers.

The city has drawn people throughout the ages since it was founded in the 13th century by the Norwegian king Håkon Håkonsson. With its perfect location out at sea, the city was for a long time a fishing port and the starting pont for international shipping. During the 16th century, Marstrand was also the center of herring fishing in Europe. At the peace of Roskilde in 1658, Marstrand became Swedish and then became an important trading place for Sweden. Because of this, part of the Swedish fleet was also stationed there, wich made king Karl X Gustav decide to buld a fortress on the island to protect the city.

In 1775, Marstrand received free port privileges, which meant a certain autonomy in relation to the rest of the country. Compared to the rest of

Sweden, Marstrand had, among other things, freedom of religion, freedom from coercion, free immigration and also free from tax. Thye free port was created to attract labor from the rest of the world, which it did, but ended in 1794.

Nowadays the city is best known as a seaside resort and sailing town but crowds of people still travel here to visit the fortress and hear about the town's long history.

We will leave from Marstrand around 14:30 and there will be stop at Scandic Göteborg Central and Göteborg-Landvetter Airport.
